Thank you for your interest in joining the SolidariTee team for the 2026/27 academic year! SolidariTee is an entirely volunteer-run charity that unites students and young people to create lasting positive change in the support available for refugees and other people seeking safety across borders.

In the 2025/26 academic year, SolidariTee has been fortunate enough to be made up of a movement of over 500 student volunteers across over 40 university teams, working alongside a dedicated central team and leadership team. In this academic year, we also reached another milestone: over £600,000 provided in funding to support legal assistance and mental health support for refugees and people seeking asylum.

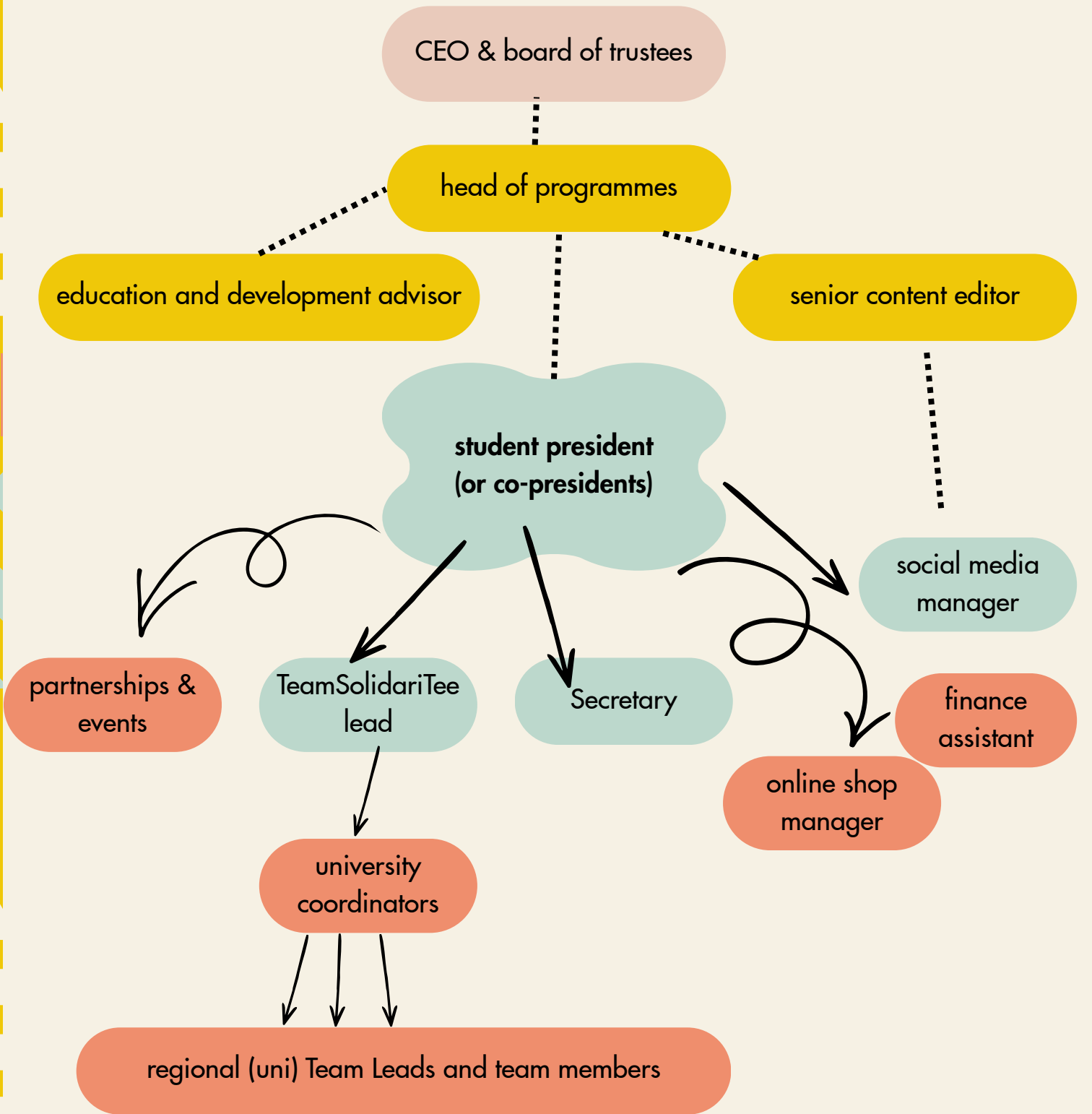

All of these roles will cover the 26/27 academic year (June 2026 to August 2027 approximately), though it would be beneficial if volunteers were able to commit to a slightly longer duration to ensure a handover period is possible. Some roles are best suited to current university students, whilst others are open to all self-identifying young people and those who support us.

Key Responsibilities

- provide **overall coordination support** to ensure the smooth running of the central team and regional teams
- lead communication for the **publicity of volunteer opportunities** via careers service websites and sending emails to university departments
- act as focal point for **communication with all new applicants** to join the team, including coordination to arrange interviews with other members of the leadership team where necessary
- taking minutes and following up on actions arising from **leadership team meetings**
- ensure that team member database is kept up to date
- Perform other coordination and communication tasks according to needs throughout the year

Key Responsibilities

- lead a team of social media officers to create high-quality, engaging content across our social media platforms
- hold regular content meetings to identify topics to be covered across our digital educational content
- create and/or support other team members to create accessible infographics and educational posts that contribute to our overall awareness-raising strategy
- respond to current events and news affecting refugees and displaced people
- lead the design of publicity content and other posts relating to other relevant information for our followers, such as opportunities to join the team, purchase t-shirts, attend events, or information about the charity's work

- excellent research & written communication skills and ability to synthesise complex information in simple terms
- demonstrated experience collaborating with or supporting others to deliver their best work
- experience providing editing or proofreading support
- experience of content creation for social media and knowledge of how to drive digital engagement and reach

Events Lead

Key Responsibilities

- work alongside a small team of events officers to organise educational events such as speaker panels
- lead the organisation of our annual conference, including contacting venues, reaching out to speakers, coordinating practicalities for the day, and overseeing a conference working group.
- coordinate with other members of our central team when necessary, such as for event publicity
- provide support and guidance to our regional teams and university coordinators to help with planning regional events.

- experience organising events as part of SolidariTee and/or other student societies and charitable initiatives
- good organisational and administrative skills
- confident written communication
- knowledge or demonstrated interest in learning about migration, displacement, and refugee contexts
- commitment to promoting inclusive, decolonial approaches to communications and awareness-raising.

Key Responsibilities

- research and explore opportunities for new partnerships and collaborations with university societies, college balls and other groups and organisations.
- lead a small team of Partnerships Officers to reach out to potential partners
- engage with partner groups and organisations to coordinate fundraising and/or educational projects.
- work alongside other members of our central team where necessary, such as to highlight partnerships or partner events on social media.
